- 14. Submitting a paper that was obtained in large part from a website (e.g., 'essay banks') <u>charging a fee</u> as your own work.
- 15. Getting questions or answers from someone who had already taken a test.

- 16. Fabricating or falsifying a bibliography
- 17. Fabricating or falsifying lab or research data (e.g., adjusting data to obtain a significant result).
- 18. Taking part in an exam in somebody else's name.
- 19. Having someone take part in an exam in your name.
- 20. Allowing another student copy your coursework.

- 21. Allowing another student to copy from you during a test or an exam.
- 22. Selling, purchasing, or distributing in some other way, test or exam copies or questions.
- 23. Lying about medical or other circumstances to get special consideration by examiners.
- 24. Lying about medical or other circumstances to get an extended deadline or delay writing an exam.




Which of the following circumstances justifies test/exam cheating, in your mind?









MEN vs WOMEN – all respondents





